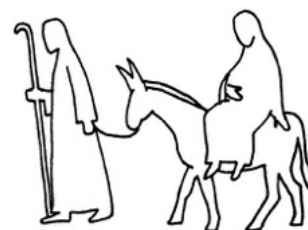

West Wratting Book Club

Our book for November was 'Paris Echo' by Sebastian Faulks. As the title suggests it is set mainly in Paris. The main characters are an Algerian teenager, Tariq, fed up with his life and keen to find out something more about his half-French mother, and an American woman, Hannah, who had spent time there as a History Major and had come back to research the women of Paris during the German occupation of the Second World War.

It was described as a comfortable and interesting read, well written, and most enjoyed it very much. Some found the flipping about between characters without notice confusing. There was an interesting contrast between the two main protagonists. We were struck by the 'ignorance' of the young about the history of their country and culture, as well as the light it shone on the attitudes of the French during the Second World War, many of whom seemed to want a comfortable life even if the Nazis won, with little admission of guilt about siding with the German troops when it suited them. It was revealing to some to read of the war crimes of Nazis on French and English SOE spies, as well as of the French on Algerians (although there were atrocities on both sides) and the Jewish people.

Others felt the book highlighted the greyness of war – neither 'good nor bad' and not clear cut. Although it seemed to be a happy ending for all, one person wondered if this was the case. Some thought the end quite bland. Another theme was whether it is always a good thing to hold on to memories and hurts for too long, whether national or personal?

Scores were 7 and 8 out of 10.

We will not be reviewing a book for December as we are having our Christmas meal, so we will next meet at The Chestnut Tree on Wednesday 14th January at 7.30 pm to review the seasonal read of 'The Lion, the Witch & the Wardrobe' by C S Lewis.

Parish Matters

Over Advent and Christmas I often revisit well-loved writings. As a child I used to perform, with my brother and sister, the poem by Clement-Clarke Moore: *'Twas the Night Before Christmas* for my parents on Christmas Eve. As an adult I have enjoyed re-reading *Approaching Christmas* by Jane Williams, a companion to the Christmas season rich in joy and wisdom, as well as a collection of poems and commentaries by Janet Morley entitled *'haphazard by starlight: a poem a day from Advent to Epiphany'*.



The intriguing title: *'haphazard by starlight'* actually comes from a poem, entitled *BC-AD*, by U A Fanthorpe. Ursula Fanthorpe was a poet and a Quaker, who used to write a new Christmas poem each year to include with her Christmas cards to friends. They were usually short and sought a fresh, unsentimental take on the familiar story. This approach could also provide a jolt of defamiliarisation for the reader, reminding us of the extraordinary nature of the gospel truth.

As part of the Christmas carol service at Hildersham church some years ago, members of our children's church council gave a reading of *BC-AD*. It's a poem in the form of a Shakespearean sonnet, but with the lines divided into threes rather than fours, each one beginning with the phrase 'This was the moment . . .'. Indeed, the poem begins with the dramatic announcement: 'This was the moment when Before / Turned into After'.

The poem then continues in a slightly meandering style and contains references to familiar characters from the birth narrative – the shepherds described as 'a few farm workers' and the magi as 'three / Members of an obscure Persian sect'. The meandering style is interrupted, however, by the jolt of last two lines, which presents the moment those familiar characters, perhaps to their own astonishment, 'Walked haphazard by starlight straight / Into the kingdom of heaven'.

Amidst all that is comfortingly familiar about Christmas, I hope we can be alert to the astonishing good news of the gospels, even if it does sometimes seem we are walking towards this truth as if 'haphazard by starlight'. For the account of Jesus' birth speaks of a moment when everything changed. A child, born in humble circumstances, is the Christ child who is greeted, as Luke's gospel says, as "Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord". Good news conveyed by these simple words, which invite a lifetime's reflection: Jesus is "Emmanuel, which means, 'God is with us'". Good news worth responding to, celebrating and sharing, and which can shape the way we live in all the times and seasons of our lives.

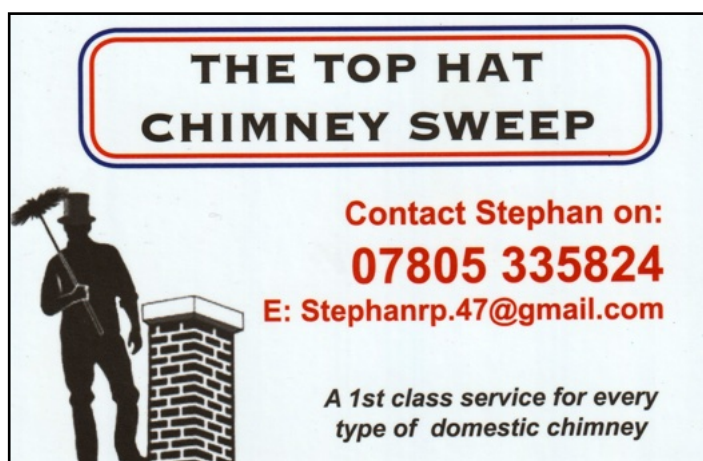

Kingsway Solar Community Action

It's been a busy month. We've published a report on land use and solar energy, drawing on new modelling by Tony Day showing that large-scale solar offers limited grid benefits. We've promoted the **#AskEd** campaign with **Stop Oversized Solar**, challenging the government's renewable-energy strategy.



We issued an **Open Letter to Ed Miliband** in response to the government's claim that 76% of the public 'wouldn't mind' living next to a solar farm. We also contacted George Freeman MP following the APPGSTA (All-Party Parliamentary Group on Science & Technology in Agriculture) report 'Feeding Britain Sustainably to 2050', which warns that current land-use policies risk undermining UK food security.

We are continuing to encourage our MP to engage more fully with the inadequacies of the consultation process, which has left many residents feeling poorly informed.

During the consultation phase we strengthened our links with communities along the grid-connection corridor, and we are now working with BEAT (Burwell Energy Awareness Team) to help maintain pressure on these issues.

It has also been a busy month for wildlife, with sightings of golden plover and lapwings near the Fleam Dyke as winter migration gets under way. Please continue to log any wildlife observations on *iRecord*, particularly along the grid connection corridor. Every record counts.

We are working closely with the Parish Council Alliance who are seeking legal representation, which will be critical in the next stage. Our Crowd Justice fundraiser supports this effort. This ensures that donations only go towards a fully-funded case, with automatic refunds if targets aren't met. Every pledge, large or small, helps.

Finally, a note on sign thefts. During the consultation it was wonderful to see so many signs, banners and stickers displayed. Unfortunately, after some early

incidents, we've now had further reports of signs being taken. These are expensive to produce and funded entirely through your donations. If signs are removed from private land, please report it to the police and request an incident number. This helps us build a clearer picture of what's happening.

Wishing everyone a very Happy Christmas, and thank you for your support throughout 2025.

Weston Colville Parish Council

A meeting was held on Monday 3rd November. Full minutes and meeting documents are available at <https://www.westoncolville-pc.gov.uk>

Cllr Harvey reported that he was chasing to have contractors cut the ditch behind Horseshoe Lane/The Green. He advised that the SCDC response to the Kingsway Consultation had been added to their website. The report was very damning, particularly about the lack of engagement and communication from Kingsway.

Cllr Batchelor would chase up clearing and replacing the salt bin contents.

Flooding – Cllr Garrod would meet with Cllr Harvey to inspect the works that had been carried out and what would need to be carried out. Cllr Durham had alerted the flood wardens with a forecasted storm, and cleared the gulleys, but it had not come to anything.

MVAS – the signs were located on Mill Hill, and near the recreation ground. There had been a significant increase in traffic through the village due to the road closure in West Wratting. It was felt that the repeater 30 sign on Common Road would be a good location, however the post needed to be reported, and replaced. The clerk would carry this out.

Kingsway Solar – a verbal report was provided from the PC Alliance Funding Meeting. The parish council's response to the Statutory Consultation was submitted prior to 29th October. The next stage would be the submission to the Planning Inspectorate in March. Cllr Durham was thanked for sending the response from the PC, and the councillors for their contributions.

RBL Poppy Wreath – it was the turn of Weston Colville PC to lay the wreath at Wratting Common. Cllr Pagonis would lay the wreath. £15 would be donated.

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – The defibrillator cabinet would be installed on 4th November. Once installed the clerk would book free training for parishioners through Community Heartbeat. The defibrillator would be registered with The Circuit and Webnos, which would ensure that it was registered with the ambulance service.

Biodiversity - Cllr Garrod was maintaining the pond, and it was felt that the pond did not need any further

excavation. The bullrushes were controlled, to ensure they did not encroach too much. The willow tree and brambles were also controlled. The hedging by the telegraph pole would be cut back, to increase visibility, for vehicles exiting the Reading Room car park. The area offered big benefits for biodiversity, particularly for insect/birds. The pond had dried up due to the very dry summer. It was determined to apply for SCDC's grant for six free trees, and to apply for one larger sapling. Cllrs Garrod and Jennings would organise this.

Playgrounds – no action required on the recreation ground. The clerk was querying the price of the inspection of Church End, as the inspector had completed two separate reports for the areas on the recreation ground for £250, and wanted to charge a further £155 to inspect Church End, which seemed excessive. The contractor would be adding turf around the slide in Church End.

Dates for 2026 – 7th January, 2nd March, Wednesday 13th May, 6th July, 7th September, 2nd November.

The parish council met on 10th November in the village hall. Five members of the public attended.

Village Updates – residents noted the forthcoming village hall AGM (on 9th December at 7.30 pm), ongoing Speedwatch activity, and continued footpath and village maintenance. Volunteers for litter picking and minor maintenance are always welcome, and should contact the clerk. A query about the possible donation of a storage container to the Sports Pavilion was discussed; the council explained that required planning and fire-safety documentation had not been provided.

Council Business– the councillor vacancy remains open, and anyone interested should contact the clerk. Work will shortly begin on the 2026/27 budget, following the same approach as last year, with the Finance Committee meeting planned for early December.

The council approved the updated lease for the d’Abo Tennis Club, and agreed that the £1,200 annual insurance grant to the village hall will continue each year.

Two event requests at the Sports Pavilion were approved (Scouts/Guides on 15th November, and a members’ event on 21st November).

The clerk will also contact The Chestnut Tree pub regarding support for the village defibrillator.

Planning & Highways – no new planning applications were received. A matter concerning an overhanging tree will be raised with Greater Cambridge Shared Planning.

The council noted that West Wratting was not included in the 2025 20 mph scheme grants, and that the delayed Local Highway Improvement works (gates and lining) remain outstanding; this will be escalated by the County Councillor.

Sports Pavilion Club – the SPC Committee is continuing work on a revised structure for the club. The council agreed to collaborate on a clearer process for assessing and approving additional events, ensuring safety, compliance and appropriate documentation.

Village Assets – 3,000 litres of bark were delivered and spread in the play park; missing bolt caps were replaced, and defibrillator pads renewed following its use in September.

Kingsway Solar Farm – the council approved its response to the statutory consultation.

Next Meeting – the next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 12th January at 7.30 pm in the village hall.

School trips are an essential part of life at LVC, enriching our curriculum and offering experiences beyond the classroom. One of the most significant events in our calendar is the two-yearly Battlefields trip to Northern France and Belgium.

Led by the History Department, the trip takes 95 students from KS3 and KS4 on a journey through key sites of World War I. Starting in Ypres, students visit Essex Farm Cemetery and an Advanced Dressing Station, learning how medical care was delivered close to the front lines. At Mansel Copse and the Somme, they explore the realities of trench warfare and the immense human cost of conflict. The Thiepval Memorial to the Missing and the moving Last Post ceremony deepen their understanding of remembrance and loss. Throughout the weekend, students develop historical knowledge of why men fought, empathy for those who endured unimaginable hardship, and insight into the impact of war on individuals and societies.



Last month we also had over 100 students visiting Bletchley Park, the historic home of World War II codebreakers. Here, they watched a live demonstration of the Enigma machine and took part in hands-on decoding activities, discovering how logic, mathematics, and teamwork were used to crack secret messages. The experience not only illuminated the vital role of codebreaking in the Allied victory but also highlighted its lasting influence on modern computing and cybersecurity.

Both trips offer students a unique opportunity to connect with history in a tangible way. These experiences remind us that the past is not just something we read about, and that it shapes the world we live in today.
